

THE BISHOP'S SCHOOL - CAMP PRE-PRIMARY SECTION STORYTELLING ACTIVITY BOTH SESSIONS



"Young children learn more from stories than from formal teaching"

Storytelling for kids is a fun and creative way to develop their language and imagination skills. It also promotes social and emotional learning. Listening to stories can trigger a child's imagination and transport them to places beyond their immediate environment. Stories also help in enhancing student's vocabulary.

A fun storytelling session was organised for our Lower Kindergarten and Upper Kindergarten students on 12<sup>th</sup> April, 2024.



It was conducted by Mrs. Sharanya Sriram, who is an excellent story teller and illustrator since 2016. Ma'am has held several moral based story sessions for our children in the past. Mrs. Sriram had planned a mixed bag of stories and rhymes for our children. The story of 'The Happy Hippo' for the Upper Kindergarten children and 'Mickey Goes to School' for the Lower Kindergarten children were narrated using hand puppets. Ma'am used interactive words to reveal different elements and varied tones of voice, captivating the children's attention.

During the telling of the story Ma'am paused in between creating a break in the story at the right time to spark curiosity in the children and getting them eager to know more. Rhymes like, "Wheels On The Bus" and "Say Hello To You" helped to draw the children's attention. Mrs. Sriram introduced an array of novel vocabulary while modulating her vocal cadence to resonate with the diverse sentiments and emotions evoked within the narrative. Ma'am's body language was most appropriate and helped to enhance the session.









Ma'am ended the session by playing games with the children like 'Guess the Name of the Animals' and 'Hide and Seek' on modes of transport.

It was indeed a fun and valuable session for our young learners which not only activated their imagination but also entertained them and surely made them happy.
