

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

1991-92

The Bishop's School continues to be as a field which the Lord hath blessed, for things which are good, true, lovely, noble and of good report do here flourish and abound. It has preserved an untarnished name, it is grown in stature and in strength. It is exalted in the love and reverence of all its members. It ever strives to be an instrument dedicated to the Glory of God.

The tone, the discipline, the educational environment, the standard of activities and games, ICSE results, and all that make up the fabric of this School are sound, healthy and creditable, and the noble end-product a tribute to the fulfilment of its worthy aims and objectives.

There has been an insidious campaign by some to malign and tarnish the enviable good reputation built up over many years by dedicated devotion of Staff and boys. In reply to this I will say 'come and see for yourself' - and at any time, any day, you will find a happy, healthy and educationally sound atmosphere and an ethos worthy of the best.

With these thoughts I draw your attention to the report for the year 1991-92.

Strength

We had nearly 2000 boys on our rolls including 240 boarders from all walks of life, a variety of socio-economic backgrounds and from all parts of the Nation. Here in Bishop's they are knit together in one integrated tolerant family without feelings of colour, caste or creed. In fact we could be said to be one of the finest examples of integration, a much needed thing in this divided Nation.

Leadership

Boys learn the art of leadership in the traditional prefectorial system, and we had a fine team of Prefects functioning under the exemplary leadership of the Head Boy Amit Chaure. Boys learn to be responsible and are given duties that bring out the best in them. A Prefect's tie has much meaning in the School.

Social Service and Giving

Our Staff and boys as always have shown care and concern for the poor and needy, the orphans and widows and the downtrodden. A Fete was organised to help founding the School at Shanti Seva Sadan by the Society of St. Mary the Virgin in India at Lonavala. We raised over Rs. 48,000/- and I am glad to announce that with this sum plus 35 tables and chairs given by our School, the Shanti Seva Sadan School was founded on 15th August this year.

In August last year our Scouts and some Staff under the guidance of Mr. S. Fernandes invited 800 orphans to spend a day at Bishop's. These children had a lovely day here full of games, cultural programme, eats and lunch. This feature was repeated in January this year with 1300 orphans from the Hindu, Muslim, Christian, and Parsi orphanages. Our boys learn that it is more blessed to give than to receive and collections were made for several worthy causes, noteworthy being for the leprosy mission, medical expenses of Mrs. N. Brown an ex-matron, Babu and his late wife our old sweepers, and Shellar an old Kitchen servant, heart operations of Bishop Andrews, two boys P. Jadhav and A. Sohone. Also for orphans of Panchhowd. They sold a considerable amount of UNICEF cards, and hamper tickets for poor Anglo-Indian boys. Mr. N. deSousa and Mr. Aviet sold old books, magazines, bottles and newspapers for the poor. Several boys were personally involved in helping and serving needy children. This makes them aware and involved in what we take to be our social responsibility.

Co-curricular Activities

Throughout the year we have a packed programme of over 25 different games and activities, giving every boy in our School an opportunity to develop an all-round personality. It is this aspect of Bishop's, sincerely pursued and encouraged, which makes a boy into a man - a fine specimen of a man.

The Scouts continue to flourish under Mr. S. Fernandes, Messrs. Chavan, Baskaran and Gaikwad: They have produced : 9 Governor's Scouts, 10 First Class Scouts and 15 Second Class Scouts. The Scouts attend to daily traffic duties and were responsible for the programmes in which hundreds of orphans were given a fine treat. Small wonder that our troops (the oldest in India) are rated among the best in the country and placed first in the National Jamboree, first in the National Integration Camp and a close Second in the Asia-Pacific Jamboree.

The Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme and the Adventure Club have done very well under Mr. H. Gomes, assisted by Mr. G. Gomes, Mr. J. Zamen and Mr. Mogre. 11 boys obtained Bronze Awards and some are working for a Silver Award.

Football has always evoked much interest. Our School teams as usual did extremely well in the Inter-School Tournament. The Seniors XI coached by Mr. H. Gomes and Mr. C. Dupratt reached the Quarters, the Minis under Mr. W. Burton and Mr. N. Mogre were Runner-up and the Juniors under Mr. E. Pope and Mr. J. Zamen were Champions in the Inter-School Tournament in which over 20 teams participated.

In the Annual Bible Quiz conducted by the Scripture Union both Senior and Junior Teams have won the Trophy for 3 years consecutively; so we now have the privilege of retaining the Trophy permanently. Mr. K. Singh deserves credit for this feat.

Debating under Mr. Guzder continues to maintain a high standard enabling us to win the Jaycee Trophy, Patwardhan Trophy and the Centrafest Debating Trophy and Runnersup in the Kurup Trophy. The outstanding Debaters were : 1) R. Dalal, 2) A. Ganguly and 3) A. Gazder.

The Hockey Teams achieved a good standard under Mr. E. Pope, Mr. N. Mogre, Mr. C. Dupratt and Mr. V. Jagtap, and we now have Annual Fixtures against St. Peter's School, Mazagaon, with whom we shared the honours last year.

The School Choir trained by Mrs. Jolly and Miss Patel was outstanding in its performance in the Festival of School Choirs as well as our own School Concerts.

The Science Club under Mr. Highland, Mr. Singh and Mrs. Jadhav did very well in the Inter-School Eureka Science Exhibition organised by the Dastur School. The Astronomy Club under Mr. C. Highland is the only one of its kind in Schools. Our boys were highly commended by the well-known Scientist Prof. Narlikar when they were placed 3rd in a competition in which all the other teams were college teams and our School the only pioneer School to take part, and against university level competitors our boys put up an outstanding performance. Mr. Highland and his boys also published a Newsletter on Astronomy the first by any school in the land.

Our School took part in 'Centrafest' an inter-school competition conducted and organised by the Rotoract Club of Pune. In this 15 schools vied for the honours in a tough competition involving 12 activities; Bishop's emerged overall Champions coming first or second in almost all the events. Our teams worked under the able guidance of Mr. Guzder, Mr. Aviet, Mr. Highland assisted by several members.

Camps were organised by Mr. Gomes, Mr. S. Fernandes and Mr. Dupratt. A number of boys benefit from these outdoor activities.

Our Concerts, Exhibition of Art, Craft, Science, Photography, Economics and Commerce, our P. T. display, Athletics, are of a very high and excellent standard.

In cricket S. Nadkarni was selected to play for Maharashtra Juniors and in Swimming the Chaphalkar brothers represented the State in the Nationals.

Our boys did well in Table Tennis Tournaments under Mr. Aviet, Badminton under Mr. G. Gomes, Basket Ball under Mr. Pope, Boxing under Mr. R. Wandre and Volley Ball under Mr. Singh. They also did well in Tennis winning the Junior Trophy. The credit for this must go to many Staff and P.T.I's Mr. Wandre and Mr. Austin who spent much of their spare time promoting these activities and coaching the boys. I place on record my appreciation for all they do for the School.

Academics and ICSE Results

But it is not all fun and games in Bishop's and without pressurising our boys there is a high standard of academics at all levels from KG to 10, and I am pleased and proud to report that our ICSE Results as in the past were excellent. All the 86 ICSE candidates were successful, 76 obtained a First Division, 10 Second division and there are no failures. In the first Division group 43 boys obtained over 75% and 2 of our top boys obtained 90%. Our best boy Ashish Khanna obtained 91.3 being a close Second to a girl in St. Helena's whose was the best result in Pune. An analysis of our Results over the last decade shows a steady consistent improvement so I find it most amazing that anyone should assert that there is a deteriorating educational environment and that Bishop's School, Pune, is not what it should be. There is, however, a Persian saying that 'people hurl stones only at a fruit-bearing tree'.

After School our boys having received a sound foundation continue to shine and be among the best in leading Colleges like St. Vincent's, Wadia, Fergusson, as well as in Medical, Technical and Engineering Colleges in India and abroad. Only recently, two of our boys competing against the best in the world were selected to leading Universities in the United States e.g. S. Chinoy obtaining a place and a full 5 - year Scholarship in the University of Richmond, and Mark Chaudhary to the famous Massachusetts Institute of Technology which is the most coveted University for Engineering in the world. There are several other boys doing well abroad like K. Aga in the U.K., and Sachin Mirchandani in the U.S.A. Sachin being placed among the 10 top Scholars there. It would take much time if I were to make a detailed inventory of the hosts of boys who bring credit to themselves, their School and indeed the Nation. I can go on highlighting and window dressing because there is much more to Bishop's than can be contained in a report of this nature. Suffice to say that all our Staff in all Departments do their best to create a healthy academic environment in which every boy can develop a good all round personality and achieve his full potential. If we dearly care for our boys as we must and we do, our sustained efforts day after day unceasingly must be fully directed to train our boys how to discriminate - what to accept and what to reject - and I pray to God to grant to each one of you sitting here the wisdom and the knowledge to achieve this. It is only with God's saving grace that this can be done.

The Senior Prize Day and entertainment programme was held on Wednesday, the 28th August 1991, at 5.00 p.m. in the Harding Hall.




There was a short interval of about 15 minutes after which the guests again went into the hall for the Variety entertainment programme.

The programme turned out well. This would not have been possible if the boys, staff and others had not worked so hard for it.








Senior Cock House - Bishop's House



Our juniors did well in the Hockey season by coming second, but we came fourth in the sub-juniors and third in the seniors.


Although the year was not a very good one for us, yet I am sure that our boys will put up a very much improved performance next year. Watch out, Arnould, Bishop's and Mansfield!



Come January and have a look at Simba-House Field. There you could see lots of boys banging and pushing and scooping the ball. Yes! It was "Hockey Time!"



PRINCIPAL'S SERMON 1992 21st October, 1992

"MAY THE WORDS OF MY MOUTH AND THE MEDITATION OF OUR HEARTS BE ACCEPTABLE IN THY SIGHT, O LORD OUR STRENGTH AND OUR REDEEMER"

Once again we are here together as a School to worship, honour, glorify, praise and thank our Heavenly Father for his countless gifts and mercies bestowed upon us and our School. We thank Him for our long and glorious history, for her worthy sons, for our Founders and Governors, Principal, Staff and servants, benefactors and boys who down these 128 years have built the great and good heritage which is ours today. No one can count what we owe to these men of vision with their eyes ever set on good and noble goals, and their assiduous efforts to fulfil God's Holy Will : men who trod the lighted path filled with God's Holy light diligently spreading His loving rays in the School and the world, touching the lives of boys and teaching them to sanctify their minds and Soul with the light of our blessed Lord. We thank God for Rev. G. L. Fenton and 15 boys of this Church that made the start of our School, and Mr. Samuel Brierly whose labours were not those of a hireling but one whose devotion to duty nurtured this School in its early tender years, and the many whose loving care and devotion over the years have made it into a fine centre of learning whose influence reaches out like bright rays to the far corners of our land - and indeed well beyond to many distant shores.

From these thoughts I would endeavour to turn your thoughts to what is required of us in our time here. I believe that God wants us to walk in the light with His word as a lamp unto our feet, to be so filled with the light, that we shine in this dark world of sin and woe, that this light will lead us to do such good works which men may see and glorify our Father in Heaven, that these noble deeds may light up our School and the world around us as a blessing to many, and that we will be touched by the inner light that will make our souls worthy of God's heaven when our work on earth is done. In the first chapter of the book of Genesis, the first book of the Holy Bible, is related the story of creation. We are told that God created the Heaven and the earth and that the earth was without form and void, and darkness was upon the face of the deep - and that the first thing God created was light which He separated from the darkness.

Firstly, we must earnestly seek to be guided by the LIGHT THAT LIGHTS UP OUR WAY.

Just imagine if this whole place and the world around us were to be suddenly plunged into absolute darkness without even a ray of light. Surely there would be considerable chaos and panic. And if this blackout persisted people would be gripped with fear. They might start groping about as if blind, some might run helter-skelter in the dark bumping into things, tripping, stumbling and falling over obstacles they cannot see. Some would most certainly cry out for help, for a torch, or candles or matches. And we all know that even a small momentary flame would shed enough light for people to find their bearing and see their surroundings. The objects, the place and people around them would be rendered visible with but a small ray of light.

The absence of light makes our eyes quite useless. We need light to see and to show us the way. In order to move about safely or know where we are going or where we are we need light. To avoid the pot holes, pitfalls and dangers around we have to light the streets, lanes and highways as also our homes, our places of industry and work.

If we are to see and avoid the dangers of this life the torch we carry must be the heavenly light that comes from God. For it is the brightness that comes from the countenance of God that lights up the Highway to Heaven. The word of God throws light upon the signposts and traffic signs, it makes clear the way for, remember, along this way Satan too has put up beautiful deceptive sign-posts to side-track us, to tempt us to stray away from the straight path and attract us to dens of iniquity, sin and wickness such as drugs and sex perversion. These dazzling, attractive, artificial lights have to be avoided at all costs, for they only lead to hell and damnation and destruction.

To avoid being carried away to these tempting by-lanes we need the presence of God's Holy light; His word must be a lamp unto our feet and to walk in its light is the path of Salvation.

Most of you must know the poem about the "blind men of Hindustan" who went to see an Elephant though all of them were blind. The one who fell against the elephant's sturdy side said it was like a wall, another feeling the tusk declared it was like a spear, the one that held the squirming trunk declared it to be like a snake, the one who felt the knee said it was like a tree and the one who touched the ear said it resembled a fan, the one who, groping, seized the swinging tail was sure it was a rope. Naturally all were quite wrong for they could not see. They could only have known what the elephant was really like if they had seen the whole thing. Likewise we too would have a wrong concept of things without God showing us the truth.

May God grant that each one of you here will clearly see the way ahead, and no matter

how rough or tough the path you will stick to it and be honest, pure and upright, and may God the Heavenly Father guide your footsteps.

Secondly we must let God LIGHT UP OUR LIVES

Jesus said "Let your light so shine before men that they may see your good works and glorify your Father in Heaven". So we not only need to see our path; we need to ourselves shine like stars with our hearts and minds filled with light, and for this we must seek Him who is the "Light of the world".

When Moses came down from Mount Sinai after receiving the ten commandments, his face shone so bright that it had to be covered with a veil for he had been in the presence of God. A life with Jesus as the Source of Light will be a spiritually illuminated life. It will be lit up with holy thoughts and noble goals. It will be a saintly life. And every boy can be a saint. Every boy can hate evil, detest the use of foul language, hate telling lies, abhor cheating and refrain from any act that would tarnish his life. You can resist temptation and oppose the bullies who force you to commit sin. And I venture to say that this is a tough task, for you have to resist evil every day, indeed many times a day; and always remember, my boys, it takes more guts and courage to be good. Evil often creeps into a school when the many who are good feel afraid to stand up and crush the few who would spread dark and dirty deeds.

There is also the ever-present danger that we may cut ourselves off from the saving grace and light of God and shut ourselves in with false beliefs and passing fancies; that we recede into the dark caverns of our mind and build barriers that cut off the light. It is at these times we must have the courage to face the truth that darkness is overtaking us and that we need to remove the thoughts and break the habits that make us sin.

Jesus bids us shine with a pure light Like a little candle burning in the night In this world of darkness He bids us shine You in Your small corner and I in mine.

Thirdly it must be our constant duty and task to spread the light so that it LIGHTS UP OUR SCHOOL AND THE WORLD with our good deeds.

It is not enough to see the way of the Lord and walk in His light. It is God's will that we spread this light of love by good deeds in our School and in this sad and broken world. We, all, sitting here are called to brighten every nook and corner of our School life; to reflect the Holy light in every classroom and dormitory and in our Halls and playground. I would pray that the beauty we behold in our Church today will be found in every spot of the School we love so dearly. We must guard against any act, any thought, any feeling, any words that darken or defile our corporate life in the School. At assembly each day we should light up the candles on the altar of our hearts and as we go to work and play each day we must shun the agents of darkness, be they young or old, from inside or outside, who would endeavour to extinguish God's light from Bishop's. May we ever be ready to put to rout them that would deter us from doing God's Holy will. Among the good deeds you did this year were the sale of scrap for the poor, the scouts inviting hundreds of orphans and giving them a happy day in their lives, the School staff and boys organising a Fete the proceeds of which established the Shanti Sadan School in Lonavala. This is how it should be in a land where there is so much suffering, pain and ignorance. In a few days from now, on the day of the darkest night, millions of diyas will mark the festival of light known as DIWALI. Each one of us here must light up the land. If you become doctors devote your life to ease the suffering of the sick, if you become engineers build homes for the aged, schools for the poor, if you are rich use your resources to bring smiles on the faces of the under-privileged, the handicapped. No matter what our vocation or business or trade we can all help the blind, the lepers, the handicapped. In fact, as I said before, what is the use of amassing a great fortune and possessions, what is the worth of riches and power which are left behind when we die? God calls you Bishopites to use your riches, your gifts, your talents to spread the light of joy and happiness.

And we must be like the lights along the seashore saving the aged the lost and the lonely of this world.

Further we must spread the message of Love and Tolerance with missionary zeal, for each day we read of the victims of terrorism, communal violence, religious intolerances, caste wars, regionalism, inter-State hatred, dowry deaths, bonded labour, child labour, and injustice. It is our task to spread the light of peace and love that all Indians are our brothers and sisters. Everyone who hates or is prejudiced is guilty of destroying the 'Deeyas' of love, of extinguishing the lamp of God. Yes, God is calling each one of us here to bring light to those that sit in darkness. He challenges us to get up from our easy chairs and out of our comfortable homes to see the shocking state of the world around us. He calls us to be channels of His love till it reaches every soul that lives in India.

We must not forget to reach out to others beyond our land. Mahatma Gandhi did. We must be conscious of the part we have to play in saving our environment and in whatever way we can help where we can, be it for the starving millions in Ethiopia and Somalia, victims of war in Europe, earthquakes in Egypt and California, and wherever our help is needed. FINALLY, I turn your mind to the light that is divinely imparted to those that seek the Lord and which sustains and preserves one's soul - the INNER LIGHT: The light that brings about spiritual illumination. This light will enable you to drive away the snares of the devil, it will enable you to experience the joy of the presence of God, when you are tempted to do wrong or go astray, it will prick your conscience and prompt you, it will make you keep your conscience clear as the noon day, it will make you worthy to be in the presence of the Lord.

The beauty of God's holiness shines through the life of those in close communion with Him.

Your conscience will be like the Star of Bethlehem taking you to the feet of our Lord.

And so, my friends, I pray that you will choose God's holy way, shine with the living light of His Holy presence, Light up the world with Loving deeds of mercy, and may the guiding star lead you to the final destination, God's heaven.

One of the things that I like best about my Science Club in the Bishop's School - Pune, (conducted and organised by Mr. C. Highland), is that it does a great deal of educational funcum-study. Out of the many interesting things they do, I was most interested in the session that uncovered methods of easy and cheap preparation of detergent. I think everyone should know about it. So, I am writing this article.

On Saturday 18.04.92, Mr. P.S. Malhotra (M/s Weikfield Products Ltd.) sent Mr. K. Gupta to our Science Club to demostrate the preparation of Dry and Liquid Detergent.

POWDER / DRY DETERGENT

| Rs./Kg. | | Wt.% (Approx.) |
|---------|--|----------------|
| 08 - | (1) Soda Ash | 20% |
| 08/- | (2) Sodium Bicarbonate | 20% |
| 06/- | (3) Sodium Sulphate | 10% |
| 18-20- | (4) Sodium Tri Poly Phosphate or Tri Sodium Phosphate | 40% |
| 40/- | (5) Alkyl Benzene Sulphonic Acid (Acid Slurry) | 10% |

Mix. (1), (2), (3) and (4) thoroughly in a vessel. (1), (2) and (3) are filters while (4) is a water softening agent.

Then add (5) to the above mixture and mix thoroughly using rubber gloves. Heat and Carbondioxide are liberated in this exothermic reaction. (5) is used for the detergency of the powder.

After a few minutes, your dry detergent is ready for use. (Home made cost = Rs. 15/-Kg.Outside cost = Rs. 35/-Kg.)

LIQUID DETERGENT

Take (1) in a beaker and add (2), (3) and (4) simultaneously stirring it constantly with a metal spoon (adjust the PH value at 7-7.5).

In a few minutes, the liquid detergent is ready for use. (Home made cost = Rs. 5/-Kg.Outside cost = Rs.15/-Kg.) Thus, as you can see clearly, soap can be prepared cheaply at home. So, go ahead and try. It's fun, it's cheap and it's educating !


WHEN FATE GETS ANGRY


One of India's best minds, Subramanium had, after two years of painstaking research, forestalled the Scientists of practically every country with this discovery.



The bullet caught Bahadur Singh in the chest. He stumbled, and then incredibly rose again and, face contorted with agony, came on.


Acheson took aim again, and fired. There was a hollow click, nothing more, as the hammer snapped on to an empty chamber.






